

EU measures to support Ukraine's economy during the war

The EU has allocated €25 million to support e-governance, cybersecurity and implementation of Ukraine's telecommunications obligations in the DCFTA in order to mutually benefit from internal market treatment.

- credit support to finance budget expenditures (approximate amount of €10 billion)
- investment support, including risk insurance for foreign investors (€10 billion)
- technical support (consultations, mentoring, assistance in obtaining cooperation from the Eurasia Federation, etc.) in the amount of approximately €1 billion

Aid for reconstruction



€15 billion to help Ukraine rebuild its economy and infrastructure after the war. These funds will be used to repair damaged infrastructure, support small and medium-sized businesses, and stimulate economic growth.

The war has significantly undermined the production capacity of agriculture and industrial production in Ukraine. The abolition of the duty will help Ukrainian companies to withstand the economic consequences of the war and continue their operations.

Humanitarian aid



Since February 2022, the European Commission has allocated €120 million for humanitarian aid programs for civilians affected by the war in Ukraine. For Ukraine, the EU has provided €100 million in humanitarian aid for 2022, €200 million for 2023 and €75 million for 2024.
